Headteacher's insight

One of our key priorities in school is **helping children to secure their core knowledge** – particularly in **reading, number facts and times tables**. We know that children learn best when key facts are rehearsed regularly in small, manageable chunks. This kind of repetition builds confidence, fluency and long-term understanding.

This is where **learning at home plays such an important role**. Home learning does not need to be formal or time-consuming to be effective. Simple, everyday moments can make a real difference. Reading road signs as you travel together, spotting number bonds on door numbers while out for a walk, or answering a times table question for each step as your child walks up the stairs to bed are all powerful ways to reinforce learning in a natural, low-pressure way.

Regular reading at home is especially important. Reading to your child, listening to them read, and talking about books together all help to develop strong reading habits. Recording this reading in your child's reading record allows us to celebrate progress and support them effectively in school. Children also benefit greatly from seeing adults read for pleasure; modelling reading at home sends a powerful message that reading matters.

We have also been **delighted to see the creativity sparked by our menu of learning tasks**. The range of responses and individual styles has been wonderful to celebrate. These tasks provide valuable opportunities for discussion at home about what children are learning in school, and they often lead to learning being deepened even further. Most importantly, they show children that their learning is valued beyond the classroom.

By practicing little and often, and by talking positively about learning at home, children begin to see learning as part of everyday life rather than something that only happens in school.

Thank you for the many ways you continue to support your child – your involvement makes a lasting impact and we can see the benefits to your children in the classroom.

I hope you enjoy the weekend together. I am looking forward to our final fortnight of this half term that will have us celebrating **national storytelling week, NPSCC number day, Children's mental health week**, finalising and sharing our scheduling for next half term with you and ending on our PTFA Wild Hair Day.

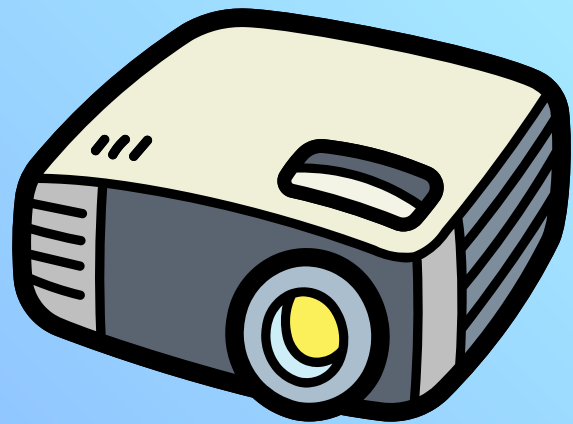

News from our classrooms

Dragonflies Class

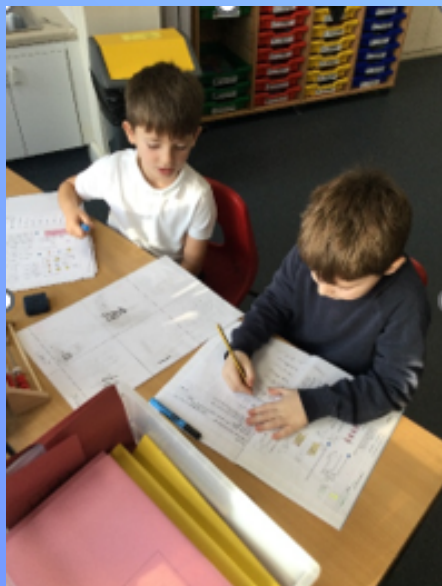
Dragonflies class have been hard at work over the last couple of weeks and have mastered many new concepts!

Maths has been a particular highlight over the last two weeks due to the children's dedication, resilience and team work. They have been developing their understanding of column method for both addition and subtraction. They started by working practically with base 10 to understand how to line up the place value and the importance of the word 'exchange' before moving on to working more abstractly in their books. This is such a hard concept which they have tackled with great enthusiasm!

They have also been enjoying writing their own holiday brochures in **English**. They have been trying to persuade people to visit Grandad's Island using rhetorical questions, emotive language and direct address.

Everyone is loving our **PE** unit of gymnastics this half term. They are so enthusiastic when we get the equipment out but are also using all of their gymnastics knowledge to create great shapes, jumps and even rolls via the equipment.

Finally, getting out for our **movement miles** has given Dragonflies an extra boost of energy and focus during our afternoon sessions. They ran, walked and jogged an incredible number of laps over the week and want to continue using this as a movement break every day!





Hedgehogs Class

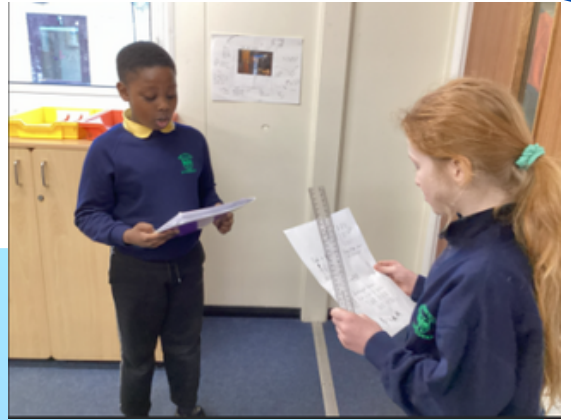
We've had another wonderfully busy week in Hedgehogs Class.

Our journey through **The Chronicles of Narnia** continues to spark so much imagination. Last week, the children wrote comparative setting descriptions inspired by the story, and it was fantastic to see them using rich adjectives and Year 4 writing features with growing confidence. Next, we'll be moving on to persuasive writing as the children compose letters encouraging Edmund to rejoin his brothers and sisters.

In **Maths**, we have been working hard on multiplying and dividing 2- and 3-digit numbers. The children are showing great determination, and practising times tables at home really helps strengthen these skills.

In **Computing**, we have been learning about the components inside a computer and how they work together. In Science, our rock investigations continue. Last week, the children created their own video tutorials explaining how fossils are formed — a brilliant blend of creativity and scientific understanding.

In **History**, we debated whether we agreed that the Roman army should or should not invade villages in Britain. We were split into two groups and had to argue our case as if we were villages of the time. In the end, we decided that we would not be happy for the Romans to invade despite the fact we know they did!

Art: Preparing for Our Platform 26 Exhibition

The art studio has been buzzing with excitement as we prepare for our upcoming Platform 26 Art Exhibition. Pupils have been developing their skills and experimenting with layering, collage and macro photography before beginning to plan and design their final pieces for the theme of 'Belonging'. We can't wait to celebrate all their hard work.

English: Planning a Mock Trial for Macbeth

In English, the children have stepped into the world of Shakespeare with great enthusiasm. We are currently planning a mock trial based on events from Macbeth, allowing pupils to analyse characters' motives, actions and moral dilemmas.

They have been:

- Gathering evidence from the text
- Preparing arguments for prosecution and defence
- Developing persuasive speaking skills
- Exploring themes such as ambition, guilt and responsibility

This engaging approach has really brought the story to life and deepened their understanding of Shakespeare's language and dramatic tension.

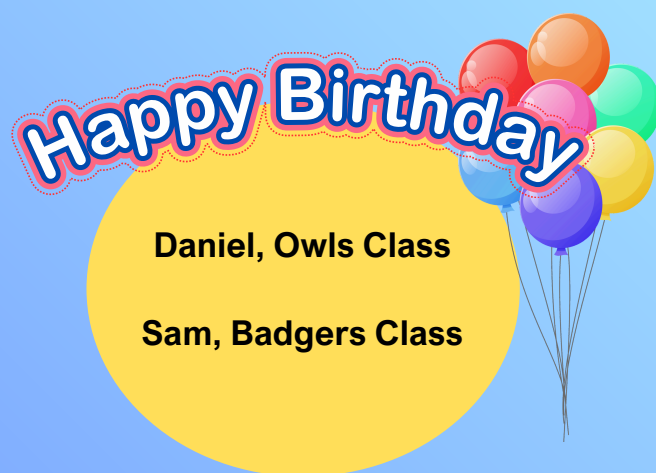
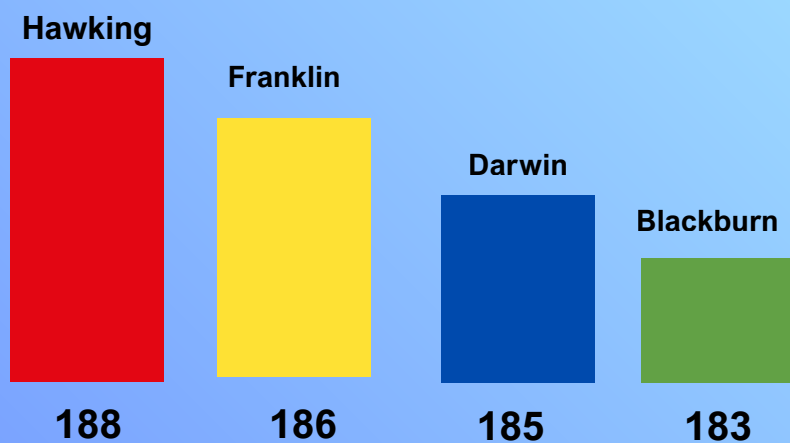
